This year, 2017, has been a landmark in the history of St. Bede's. We are in our eightieth year since being founded in 1938 and now undergoing a transition at several levels. The most obvious for us is the transition to a lay Principal in 2018.

On behalf of the Board, I wish to pay tribute to our outgoing Principal, Br. Garry Coyte, for his outstanding contribution to the life and leadership of St. Bede's over the past 11 years. Br. Garry has worked tirelessly in promoting a learning culture for all across academic, cultural and sporting areas; supporting important social justice initiatives and making these real to our students; delivering strong Christian values in the Lasallian tradition; implementing a strong focus on staff development; and overseeing an ambitious building and maintenance program to support the delivery of quality education. All of this towards developing our students into capable young men who contribute to our community. We can truly say that Br Garry will leave St. Bede's in a very sound position.

A less apparent change is the transfer of College ownership from the De La Salle Trustees to the Lasallian Mission Council (LMC). This is an important step in establishing a sustainable future for Lasallian schools and missions in Australia through increased lay involvement. LMC is a fully constituted skills-based board that will provide oversight to St. Bede's and the other Lasallian schools. We look forward to the transfer occurring at the end of 2017 and we'll communicate more about LMC in 2018. More broadly, St. Bede's has had a very eventful year in 2017 and the school Board is very proud to have supported some significant activities. This includes the redevelopment of Cypress Lodge on Phillip Island, which has played a key part in our boys' education and will now provide even better facilities and experiences. The Board has also overseen and approved the refurbishment of our ICT and technology facilities, with stage 2 of the development commencing in late 2017 and a planned completion in mid-2018. The Board would like to acknowledge the school leadership team for its vision, commitment and strong financial management to enable

these developments; and other works such as a significant investment in information technology, shade sails and ongoing maintenance to occur.

St Bede's ongoing success over many years has been a credit to the commitment of the brothers, teachers, staff, parents, friends and Old Collegians, working to deliver a quality Lasallian education to our young men; and the College Board and Committee members are proud to be a part of these achievements too. 



Our time at St Bede's has taught us the importance of our school motto: By Right Paths, highlighting our responsibilities as Beda Boys to uphold the ideals of faith, service and community in our everyday lives.

Underpinning the fabric of St Bede's culture are the values of faith, service and community, displayed proudly through our efforts during this year's Mission Action Day. With extraordinary contributions from staff, students, several local parishes and businesses, we are proud to announce we were able to raise over \$100,000 for the Lasallian missions in India, Northern Thailand and Papua New Guinea, as well as for the Lasallian Foundation. An incredible achievement. This year, the celebration of our Lasallian roots as a school community included the

celebration of Founder's Day. After our ten kilometre walk to Rickett's Point, the whole school enjoyed the array of activities prepared by the Leaders, including the return of the popular dodgeball competition and the oval slip'n'slide.

As well as our impressive Mission Action Day efforts, we also enjoyed some success in the sporting arena. Once again, the triathlon team achieved back-to-back State Schools and ACC titles. However, despite the best efforts of our senior Cross Country, Basketball and First XVIII Football teams, they were unable

to clinch victory, valiantly coming runners up.

With the Lasallian Youth Leader program growing in popularity, St Bede's has continued to expand its influence on the lives of members of our local community. The 'Vinnies Winter Sleep Out', recommenced in 2015, in an act of solidarity with the thousands of homeless Victorians who sleep every night without the comfort of their own bed. The second running of 'Have a Ball Day' again accentuated the generosity of both the junior and senior school as they donated balls for rural Indigenous communities, while 'RUOK? Day' attempted to raise awareness for the mental health issues that significantly affect the young male cohort. The image of the many leaders donning bright yellow t-shirts drew much attention to the cause.

The Class of 2017 also brought to the fore an array of new and unique ways to participate in and outside of



"Dinner with Brother David" – present and past College Leaders and Share the Mission Volunteers

Friday the 19th of May marked Founder's Day at St Bede's College. At the Founder's Day Mass, we celebrated our heritage as Lasallians, a heritage that started over 300 years ago with St John Baptist de La Salle and has since spread to over 80 countries. To acknowledge the breadth of the international Lasallian family and our connection to it, we heard prayers of the faithful prayed by our students in several different languages including Russian, Greek, Chinese, Filipino, Portuguese and French. We will also heard the First Reading in French - the language of the Founder.

We warmly welcomed Father Michael McEntee, newly appointed Parish Priest of St Patrick's Mentone and St John Vianney's Parkdale East. Fr Michael added to the 'international flavour' of the Mass by preaching the Gospel in Melanesian pidgin. We were blessed with the presence of many De La Salle Brothers from the Malvern Community, Mentone Community and those who are our own College staff. With gratitude we acknowledged and thanked them for their commitment to the Lasallian vocation of providing a Christian and human education to the young.

Then, on August 15th, the College celebrated Mass for the Feast of Assumption of Mary; a Holy Day of Obligation. The theme of the Mass was 'Humble Service' and Brother David Hawke, Provincial of the de La Salle Brothers, delivered the reflection





on the Gospel. He stated, "when I meet and talk with people from St Bede's or read your newsletter, your annual journal or look at your College website, I see that you have taken a leaf out of Mary's book, where like her, this college sees service as a priority. Like Mary, this college community sets out in haste to respond to needs in a spirit of humble service. ... we do service because we want to, because we are good human beings, good Christians, good Lasallians and we do not make a show about it." At the same Mass we took the opportunity to present and commission new Lasallian Youth Leaders (LYLs). These young

men and other LYLs have continuously volunteered their time and talent by assisting with various school-based and community activities; Retreat programs, Lasalian Youth Gathering Sydney, Caritas Pancake Tuesday, Mission Action Day BBQ, St Brigid's and St Louis' Parish Picnic, Vinnies Soup Van, Friday Night Games, Frankston Homework Help, Vinnies Winter Drive, Vinnies Sleep Out, Knit a Square Club, Have-A-Ball Day, and many other service and prayer activities.

On the evening of Assumption Day the College hosted our first Leaders' Dinner with Brother David Hawke. A group of over 40 past and present College Leaders and Lasallian 'Share the Mission' Volunteers attended "Dinner with Brother David". It was an opportunity to gather together to recall, share and reflect on experiences of leadership and volunteerism in the Lasallian tradition.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION



The renewal of the College curriculum has continued and the Religious Education department has been active in this area. The senior years have continued their studies in Religion in Society and Text and Traditions. The Year 7, 8 and 9 Religious Education curriculum renewal is also well underway, with many students studying the new curriculum.

All Year 8 students had the pleasure of visiting the Jewish Museum of St Kilda. This excursion was in line with the life and times of Jesus unit of study. The museum provided a unique opportunity for students to gain a deeper understanding of the Jewish life of Jesus, as well as aspects of the

life of a Jewish person in Melbourne. Pupil voice feedback illustrated high enjoyment levels.

Two representatives from each Year 9 Homeroom had the privilege of attending a student led initiative held at Kilbreda College. The forum discussed the issues that indigenous communities have faced in the past and still do today. Arweet Carolyn Briggs, a Boon Wurrung senior elder and founder of the Boon Wurrung Foundation, welcomed the students to country and discussed the history and tragedy that the Boon Wurrung people had faced. Brother Rick Gaffney, a former principal from Luurpna Catholic School in Balgo, spoke of the differences between traditional learning and current education, addressing how the education system is leaving indigenous students behind by failing to incorporate needs and customs. Brian Walker from Monash University spoke about racism in Australia. In his deeply personal presentation, he shared how racism had effected his mental health and offered a broader view of racism in the media as well as other issues that continue the cycle of dehumanising Aboriginal people. This led to student workshops that prompted interesting and insightful conversations.

St Bede's College proudly organises three annual international outreach volunteer programs where students and staff give their time supporting the works conducted by the De La Salle Brothers in India and Thailand. The building projects undertaken by these groups are made possible by the funds raised by the College's Mission Action Day campaign.

Thailand

In 2017, two groups of Year 11 students and staff travelled to Sangkhlaburi, Thailand (located 350km NW of Bangkok) to provide outreach to two Lasallian schools – the Bamboo School and the La Salle Learning Centre. At these schools, the De La Salle Brothers help Burmese refugee children complete their primary education.

Since 2013, St Bede's College volunteers have worked tirelessly during their time at these schools building two hostels (the Blue Sky Home and the Dream Home) to care for over thirty orphaned, refugee or neglected children, a new canteen, multi - purpose recreation building, and a toilet block to provide much

needed sanitation infrastructure. This year's Thailand volunteers continued such work by building a new dormitory, study hall and a combined kitchen and dining hall to cater for the growing number of children cared for by the Brothers.

When the volunteers were not involved in building works, they involved themselves in recreating and organising games for the school children, supporting teachers in the classroom, and participating in school activities and ceremonies.

The following volunteers took part in the Thailand Outreach Volunteer programs:

Group 1

LASALIAN SUTREACH















India

In December 2016, a group of staff and Year 12 students travelled to a small village near Batlagundu in Tamil Nadu, Southern India. There the volunteers worked with Reaching the Unreached, an organisation founded Br James Kimpton, a De La Salle Brother. Sadly, Br James passed away earlier this year.

Primarily, the volunteers worked with the housing division of RTU to build five houses for extremely poor villagers whose income is not more than \$3.00 per day. The living conditions of these villagers and their families usually consists of thatched huts that not only need replacing every year or two depending on the severity of the monsoons, but also have no basic amenities such as sanitation, plumbing and electricity. The houses that the volunteers built were permanent structures made of bricks and mortar with all essential amenities. Away from this building work, the volunteers also spent plenty of time living among orphaned, neglected and HIV positive children that Reaching the Unreached care for at their hostels and orphanages.






This year has been a tremendous year for discovery and learning in the Media department.


My first year at the College has acquainted me with some outstanding students who have turned in some terrific work.




WELLBEING CENTRE



CAREERS CAREERS

The Careers and Pathways Centre continues to provide a central place for students seeking information about courses and careers. The Centre is continually updating its many resources, and is open to students every Recess and Lunchtime. Individual careers counselling was provided to a very large number of students along with more general careers advice including VTAC course selections, SEAS and Scholarships, subject selection planning, postcompulsory transition planning, apprenticeship information, job applications (resumes/mock interview practice).

The Resource Centre of 2017 is a vastly different place to that which opened in 1971. Innovations in technology have changed the way students read, study and access information.

At the end of 2016, we were granted funds to update our Library Management System. Students can now access information from the library catalogue and electronic databases on any device from school or home. Class research and information skills are developed under the direction of Mr Michael Moses, our eLearning Librarian. Resource Centre staff are able to process resources with speed and accuracy to enhance and support the curriculum, and easily access statistics. For instance, the current number of resources is nearly 22,000 at a value of approximately \$300,000.

on our set of Kindles. This activity is an extension of our very successful RAD program run by Mrs Linda Wilkinson. It provides an option for students who prefer digital versions of texts such as Diary of a Wimpy Kid and Tomorrow, When the War Began or genres such as fantasy, humour and adventure.

BoyzRead book club under the guidance of Ms Sue Ward has embraced technology with podcasts and other presentations which they used when they visited a local primary school to engage with younger readers. Google Docs are an extensively used means of communication between book club members.

The physical environment has had a minor face-lift with a new café style area, complete with tall tables and stools and some wall art thanks to our House Arts competition. It is a popular place for boys to spread out with their laptops and books to work during study periods. The College policy of 1:1 devices has been a contributing factor in the arrangement of library furniture.

The Beacon or Learning Support Department supports the academic needs of students at the College who for any number of reasons, may be experiencing learning difficulties. Our vision is to enable all students to develop their unique strengths and to access the curriculum to the very best of their ability.

Through our Language Workshop support classes for Years 7 -10, we aim to engage students in literacy by focusing on high interest topics, which appeal specifically to boys. We use a range of resources to target the basic skills required in reading, comprehension, spelling and written language, as well as involving the small group classes in plenty of lively discussion.

This year we have been lucky enough to have Lisa Leeds, Lisa Coate and Br Doug O'Reilly as our Learning Support Assistants. They have worked mainly in the year 7 & 8 classrooms and with some students in Years 9-11. They have assisted boys in small groups or on a

one to one basis, with their planning, writing and organizational skills.

Our Homework Help Program has continued to operate every Wednesday afternoon from 3.30pm – 4.15pm in S31. However, we would like to see a greater number of boys, particularly in Years 7 & 8, coming along to Homework Help and reaping the benefits of specialized Homework assistance each week.

2017 has been another busy and productive year. Beacon staff have worked collaboratively with students, parents, college staff and an array of visiting teachers, to utilize best practice to meet the needs of all boys involved with the Beacon program. Intensive support for our students continues to be implemented through the following programs and activities:

- Homework Help (Wednesdays 3.30pm-4.15pm)
- Ongoing meetings with parents and referrals to external agencies
- Additional School visits to assist orientation for incoming Year 7 students

- Special Provisions for students during exams (NAPLAN & Semester) and VCE applications
- Provision of individualized classroom accommodations, adjustments and Personal Learning Plans.
- Games Cove lunchtime social skills and friendship building program

Beacon staff attended Professional Development Workshops this year, which focused on Dyslexia, Autism Spectrum Disorder, Using Technology to Assist Students with Reading and Written language and Navigating VCE with a Learning Difficulty.

XCAL



At St Bede's College the Victorian **Curriculum of Applied Learning** (VCAL) program is designed to provide students with a 'hands on' option for their senior studies. We focus on providing students with practical work related experiences. Along with students undertaking numeracy, literacy and personal development skills, provides students with a wellrounded alternate pathway through the senior years.

All students must attend school for three days a week, while attending a VET Course one day and undertaking a structured work placement related to their chosen industry on the other day.

A large variety of VET Courses have been well supported by our students in 2017. Certificates in Building & Construction, Automotive, Electrotechnology, Plumbing, Aviation, Animal Studies, Hospitality and Sports & Administration have been undertaken.

At St Bede's College our students are encouraged to develop a wide range of skills with specific links back to their family, school, and community. This has been enhanced by our VCAL program that is focusing on your son's education. Several activities which the students have undertaken throughout 2017 have given our students the ability to be leaders while contributing to the greater community.

Senior VCAL students attended Urban Camp in February run by the Brotherhood of St Laurence in Fitzroy. Through this tremendous program, students experienced and participated in a Breakfast Club for students living in the Atherton Gardens housing estate. Our VCAL students also assisted at Sacred Heart Primary School in Fitzroy with the Prep to Grade 3 classes, undertaking a variety of activities with the primary school students. Our young men were also given the opportunity to purchase ingredients to cook and serve a lunch for residents of the Coolibah Centre. The camp was an eye opening experience, which not only gave our students greater community engagement and awareness but also gave the boys a chance to interact with different people from varied backgrounds. This activity reinforced it for the students undertaking an awareness of social justice and the importance of community involvement.

Our students have been on some very interesting excursions which all have had very strong links back to the curriculum and outcomes being taught. Students had the opportunity to attend Margoneet Correctional Facility, where they were confronted and challenged by prisoners' real life experiences about what lead them to be there. They also attended Teenage Road Accident Group (TRAG), again highlighting the importance of making good choices.

Personal development activities this year have engaged students in areas such as rock climbing, selfdefence, paddle boarding and lawn bowls. Students also linked in with the Parkdale Beach Patrol and have volunteered to collect rubbish from the beach spanning from Mentone to Parkdale. This again highlights the community emphasis and importance in skill development our young men have obtained through our VCAL program.

Such skills have also been used in the students Structured Work Placement. They have worked in a large variety of industry specific work places, which has encapsulated and honed in on the importance of applying such skills to a real work life situation.

Our VCAL students have been undertaking a range of different electives throughout 2017, such as Beda Barista Boys, gardening with St Brigid's Parish Mordialloc and



the RSL Mentone thus highlighting their community involvement. We encouraged all students to enhance their skill levels and involve themselves in teamwork and community spirit.

Overall this year has been exceptionally rewarding and has challenged students while engaging them to further grow their confidence, knowledge and skills to real life work and community situations.

TECHNOLOGY TECHNOLOGY









2017 has seen some excellent products designed and built by students from Year 8 through to Year 12. The Technology Materials Learning Area encourages all students to develop new skills both practical and creative. This is achieved through a structured program based upon investigation, design, construction and evaluation.

The introduction to new and emerging technologies such as laser cutting/engraving machinery, 3D printers, CAD/CAM technology and a wide variety of workshop tools and equipment has ensured that students have the opportunity to develop their skills as well as gain an insight into industry like environments.

The Year 8 students were challenged with developing their very first design brief and were able to produce some very good timber pencil cases. These quality products were followed up with the design and production of some very interesting garden ornaments constructed using mild steel.

The Year 9 students enjoyed success on many levels as they designed and produced a variety of fire braziers in their metal class and superbly crafted foot stools within their timber classes. Both the metal and timber classes introduced the students to new skills and techniques as they built on the skill base developed in Year 8.

The Year 10 metal classes were abuzz with students researching, designing and building a variety of quality projects including wine racks, tables and shoe racks. The Year 10 timber students were no less busy as they produced several styles of small to medium tables that were well designed and constructed to high standard.

The Year 10 Robotics class produced some very clever designs taking full advantage of the laser CAD/CAM process. They were able to develop their knowledge of basic electronic principles as they produced printed circuit boards and coded their robots to be remotely controlled.

Our Year 11 Systems Engineering students produced some very interesting blue tooth docking stations as many of them made very good use of the laser based CAD/CAM processes and utilised a variety of materials. The Year 11 Product and Design students were busily engaged in the design and production of some quite complex projects with the constraints of flat pack designing, and improving sustainability. Examples included an ergonomic workstation, rocking and deck chairs, a timer pet feeder, and tables (some incorporating concrete surfaces).

The senior students were very busy this year particularly the Year 12 students as they worked overtime after class, during lunch and on Saturdays. All of this hard work paid off in spades. The boys have developed some extremely well researched and detailed folios which enabled them to use their considerable skills and some complex production techniques to produce quality products. These include Mason Bode's air hockey table, Jai Hale's ski winch, Campbell Pickett's electric vehicle, Daniel Schauer's outdoor mobile garden and Samuel Pinzone's Zen bed.



Fortunately, St Bede's College offers Italian, Indonesian and French language studies whose writing system, or means of being visually recorded, is Roman alphabetic, and whose reading demands on our students are similar to those of English. The Year 7-10 language students acquire communication skills in Italian

and Indonesian. Students develop understandings about the role of language and culture especially in communication, including the relationship between language, culture, and learning. Learning languages enhances personal, social, cultural and employment opportunities within the context of an interconnected

and interdependent world. It also supports the community's social and economic development.

This year, all our language students have been learning different topics and have developed their communication skills.

Year 10 Indonesian students have been busy and have enjoyed cooking classes, having prepared dishes like 'Mee Goreng', 'Martabak' and 'Lumpia'. The boys understand the role of language and cultures both in Indonesia and in Australia during cooking classes. They interact with peers and teachers using spoken Indonesian, incorporating a variety of me-verbs, pronouns and nouns during cooking. Students also


Students recognised the flexibility of sentence structure – they were aware that Indonesian uses a base word for informal language.

What an interesting year we have had in Science at St. Bede's this year! We wished our esteemed learning area leader of the past four years Mr. Owen Flattery farewell as he departed us at the end of Term 2 for a new challenge, and our students have enjoyed a year filled with knowledge, learning, and practical investigations.

The junior school has been a bustle of scientific activity all year round. Our Year 7 boys had their first experiences in a real science lab and learnt how to operate all of the apparatus and equipment safely, while learning how to conduct experiments and research. They learnt how forces relate to simple machines in Physics by constructing

mouse-trap cars, and had some up close and personal experiences with a furry friend or two during their Reptile Encounters incursion in Term 4 for their Biology classification unit. They had tremendous fun examining some of the different native wildlife we have here in Australia, and using the skills they had learnt to classify them into respective groups. Year 8 students, having completed their first full year as a secondary Science student, continued to hone their skills in the lab. They became masters at wielding a microscope to examine the difference between animal and plant cells in Biology, and compared the arrangement of particles in elements and compounds in their Chemistry unit. They examined different types of energy and used apparatus such

as catapults to examine how energy can be transformed in these types of machines. In Year 9, the focus has been on learning about some of the different body systems including the workings of both the nervous system and the endocrine system, as well as beginning to learn some of the basics of electricity in their Physics unit. They became more familiar with the Periodic Table, and learnt about the different types of chemical reactions that are used in a number of situations. The senior school sees our science programs becoming more advanced, and allows the boys to hone the skills they have learnt over the past 3 years. Our Year 10 course is geared towards preparing the boys for completing VCE Science, and all students completed a unit each of Biology, Physics, and

Chemistry. They have extracted DNA from the cells of strawberries, modelled evolution, recycled copper through a number of chemical reactions, and produced rockets to examine forces and energy. Our VCE Science students had to quickly adjust to the rigours and challenges of the new VCAA study designs, and

spent a significant part of their year conducting student-directed research in order to meet the requirements of their subjects. Our teachers have been fantastic in ensuring that each boy was well prepared for their end of year examinations, and worked hard to allow each student to achieve their best result.

We have been exceptionally proud of what we have achieved in Science at St. Bede's in 2017, and hopefully the next few years are as enjoyable again for both students and teachers!

This year we have covered topics such as physics, chemistry and forces. The first term was more of an introduction to science and in Term 2 we started to get into some pracs and work. When we did chemistry, we used equipment like Bunsen burners, beakers, test tubes and stuff that we would have to use in the lab later on in the year. We learnt how to use this equipment effectively and safely. Hopefully we get to expand our knowledge of mixing substances together in coming years. In the topic forces, we did work and pracs to demonstrate contact and non-contact forces. A key part to the unit was learning about balanced and unbalanced forces and why they are important. To help us understand why things like weight and distance are useful, we did a prac that made us measure and record distances and weight of a toy car. It was fun to do but took a bit of time. In this term we have started to design mousetrap powered cars. We were put in groups and assigned a task to complete a fully working and functional car and be able to participate in class and year level races. So far we are about 75% complete with only a few touch ups and some tests to make sure everything is working properly. Next year, I think we are both looking forward to more pracs, using different equipment and some knowledge to take away with us. If we had to sum up the year so far it would have to be described as fun, challenging, exciting and something different which was enjoyable.

As you step into the new science labs you're instantly stimulated to explore the world of science. Year 8 Science at St Bede's has been an enriching and exciting experience. We started off the year with the topic "cells." Here we learnt how they make up every living organism, from a giant oak tree to a tiny bacteria cell. We learnt how to use a microscope and discovered a whole new world unable to be seen by the naked eye. We saw how a single leaf is made up of thousands of cells. Did you know that the average human body is made up of 32.7 trillion cells!

Our next topic we delved into was the "states of matter", which are solids, liquids and gases. We conducted cool experiments changing different states of matter from one form to another and then reversing that affect. Classifying states of matter was one of our tasks but this became impossible when we discovered the mysteries of Oobleck, a constantly changing substance with a gooey texture. We looked at the density of substances and how the hotter it is the less dense it is.

Next we looked at particles which are extremely small units of matter. We discovered that atoms are the basis of what all things are made of and they are the building blocks of matter. Energy and how it makes everything move was our next topic. A catapult experiment helped explain this topic well. Light is what we learnt next which taught us how and why things can appear distorted half under water or in the distance.

Science in Year 8 was fun and filled with topic tests to evaluate our knowledge through the year. We also used Kahoot quizzes which were thrilling and competitive. They were conducted in class using the technology of iPads and smart boards, setting fellow classmates against each other in the aim to win and claim bragging rights of the most knowledgeable science student in the class. With intriguing experiments that were educational and fun, interesting topics and great teachers the students of Year 8 are always enthusiastic for Science.



The last notes from Music on The Lawn could almost still be heard reverberating through the College Grounds as we returned for another year of music making at the College.

St Bede's provides many opportunities for the College community to become involved in music making through both the Instrumental and classroom music programs.

In the classroom program, Year 7s were able to make use of our College keyboard lab and Year 8 students were introduced to the guitar and then enjoyed the challenge of learning music ensemble skills through

rehearsing and performing within rock bands.

The College continues to provide two distinct music streams in Years 9-12. A contemporary performance course leads to studies in VCE /Vet Sound Production. The Sound Production course allows students to gain skills that are widely used in the music industry while also enabling participants to receive a VCE score. VCE Music Performance enables those students who learn and play instruments to develop skills in performance craft within group and solo settings.

The Wind Symphony, which is our senior ensemble and consists of students from St Bedes and Kilbreda College, commenced the year's performances, playing to the incoming Year 7s at the Training Band recruitment evening. An enrolment of over 50 students to this group was a credit to the playing and mentoring that these senior students offered on this night.

The rehearsal camp held at Cypress Lodge allowed students from the College Jazz Ensemble and Vocal Group to prepare for their annual performance at Generations in Jazz. The Senior Autumn Concert featured performances by senior soloists from Year 12 and groups including Wind Symphony, Guitar Ensemble, and those students going to Mt. Gambier



















in Vocal Group and Jazz Ensemble.

Jeff Kennet, former Victorian Premier and first time attendee at GIJ in 2017, writing in the Herald–Sun perfectly describes why we take our vocalists and instrumentalists to this event:

"Entering the site, we saw children everywhere, aged from 10 to 17, most carrying musical instruments, all happy, all well behaved, enjoying the moment and united by their love of music.

In the evening, we assembled in the main marquee for the opening concert under the leadership of James Morrison. All the children were there — 4723 of them from every state and territory, from 123 state and private

schools involving 268 ensembles. There was no divide between rich and poor, young and younger, just an appreciation for jazz.

Seeing so many young people demonstrating their skills as members of teams, being inspired by their teachers and idols, was a delight. If only parents and governments could focus on the opportunities music provides and see it as a common language. Maybe we would not have so many young people unoccupied, bored and aimless."

Other events in what was a very busy May-June period included our Year 12 soloists performing at our Partnership school for Music Performance.

Mentone Girls Grammar. Once again, the Junior Performing Arts Night featured the debut performance of the 2017 Training Band, the Junior Concert Band, the College Drumline, Brass Ensemble and selected soloists. The semester concluded with the Instrumental music nights at which our instrumental music specialists showcased their students as soloists and in duets, trios and quartets.

The students in the band program performed at the Victorian Schools Music Festival in terms 3 and 4. These presentations not only provide an opportunity to perform outside of the College, but they allow students to receive invaluable feedback and

















advice from guest clinicians and adjudicators.

In our ongoing aim of engaging with the wider community, the Junior Concert Band, Drumline and a Rock band featuring Year 9 and 10 students played at the Nepean School and the Year 7 Training Band performed at St John Vianney's Primary school. We hope to be able to continue to visit other feeder schools in coming years. In August the College was selected to participate in the Song Makers project. Selected students from music classes across Years 9-11 had the

opportunity to work with award winning singer/songwriter Lior and arranger/producer Grant Windsor in a two day song writing workshop. This was a fantastic opportunity to be mentored by industry experts who not only shared their talents in song writing and arranging but also provided valuable insights into the contemporary music industry.

Cabaret night featuring the College Jazz ensemble, Year 11 Music students, the College Vocal group and guest staff and student vocalists was a great way to finish off Term 3.

The practical Music Performance examinations commenced at the end of the first week in Term 4. In 2016 we had 4 students undertaking solo performance.

While Year 12 students were focused on this task, other music students completed individual music assessments within classes and instrumental lessons. Our annual Music on The Lawn concert is always an enjoyable event with a relaxed atmosphere. Students from Years 7-11 were able to play as both soloists and group performers.

Continuing the pace and success of the F1TM in Schools program in 2016, 2017 proved equally as memorable and exciting for St Bede's College.

The program got off to a flying start with St Bede's College, in conjunction with Renault Australia, welcoming four-time Formula 1 World Champion, Alain Prost, and Mr Patrice Ratti, head of Renault Sports Cars Global. Mr Prost and Patrice Ratti addressed Year 8 students and a select number of senior students. They also met with Joel Bright, Peter Russell, Will Clifton and the Brighton Secondary School contingent who together as Team Infinitude came second outright in the 2016 World Finals of the F1 in Schools STEM Challenge competition.

Mr Prost and Mr Ratti were invited to the school to congratulate the members of Team Infinitude on their 0.916-second fastest car record – smashing the previous record. To acknowledge their achievements, Mr Prost presented them each with an autographed model replica of his 1993 Williams FW15C World Championship car. Believing in the benefits of the program, Mr Prost and Mr Ratti were also present to encourage more students to embark on this year's F1TM in Schools program so that they may follow in the tracks of their high achieving colleagues, pursuing excellence in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM).

Following the success of Mr Prost and Mr Ratti's visit, interest from students wanting to take part in this extracurricular program was at a record high. The F1TM in Schools STEM Challenge is a demanding program involving more than 10 million school students from 17,000 schools across 44 nations each year, including around 40,000 in Australia. In the end, there were three teams that rose to the challenge and made it through to the Victorian State Finals. These were:

Team Propulsion whose team members Tom Skehan, Gus O'Toole and Rhys Bennett competed in the Professional Class.

Team SuperLuminal whose team members Tyler Billing, Charlie ONeill, Nicholas Torpey, Ray Haryanto and Dylan Nguyen competed in Development Class.

Team Instinct whose team members Matthew Hannan, James Davidson, Joel Schoorman, Sean Dunne, and Massimo Camillo competed in Development Class.

All teams competed exceptionally well and to a very high standard, working tirelessly throughout the year to ensure that all competition elements, which included designing, testing and manufacturing a miniature F1™ car capable of speeds of up to 80km/h, were to the highest standard. Along the way, they also collaborated with many organisations, industry and higher education facilities to source knowledge, funding and various resources. So much was learnt

from all competing students as they problem solved and overcame many challenges.

At the awards ceremony, Team Propulsion were awarded Best Verbal Presentation, Best Industry Collaboration, Best Engineering and Best Portfolio and subsequently crowned Victorian State Champions for 2017. They will compete at the Australian National Final, to be held in Launceston, Tasmania, in March 2018.

Congratulations to all St Bede's students involved in F1 in Schools program for 2017! It is great to see so many students passionate about the work they undertake and producing results across the fields of engineering, science, finance, marketing and public relations. Such work is nothing short of amazing and exciting for both them as individuals, their team, and their school.


