



CHAIR REPORT

In 2018 we mark the eightieth year of St. Bede's providing Catholic education to boys in the Lasallian spirit. These 80 years have seen remarkable change, also matched by stability: We've experienced changes in society, population, culture and technology, but have also seen stability through our strong family and community support. St. Bede's has changed markedly over that time, but also retained the strong sense and commitment to delivering high-quality Catholic and Lasallian education to our young men and helping to equip them to contribute to the wider world when they leave.

On behalf of the College Board, I'd like to reflect on a few key points that are topical to our school in 2018. Firstly, I wish to express sincere appreciation to our new Principal, Mr. John Finn, as he completes his first year here at St. Bede's. As our first lay Principal, John has brought a progressive and global approach to St. Bede's across the teaching and learning; student wellbeing and development; and College administration areas. In doing so, he has also brought a strong focus and reverence to the values of St. John Baptist De La Salle and the legacy of the Brothers who contributed so strongly to the development of St. Bede's in years gone by. John recently led the process to revise our College Vision and Mission statements, through a very collaborative process - this process generated a tremendous amount of goodwill as we developed the words that define our mission as St. Bede's College.

Secondly, the Board, supported strongly by John and the College staff, has reaffirmed its ongoing commitment to ensuring St. Bede's is a child safe school. In the wake of the Royal Commission into institutional responses to child abuse, St. Bede's has implemented the recommendations relating to improved child safety and reporting.

This year has also marked the transition of school governance from the De La Salle Trustees (the Brothers) to the Lasallian Mission Council (LMC). LMC is a fully-constituted skills-based Board that will provide oversight to St. Bede's and the other Lasallian schools. St. Bede's will remain an incorporated non-profit organisation, now reporting to the LMC.

From a facilities perspective, we recently opened the final

stage of the ICT and Technology Centre, completing the latest building phase of our masterplan. We are now developing a refreshed masterplan as part of our 2019-2023 Strategic Plan. Supporting our ability to deliver quality education with top-class facilities is our aim. In these times of government funding uncertainty, we acknowledge the efforts of our business manager — Dominic Langdon and his finance team, plus the Finance Committee, for delivering a strong and sustainable financial situation that enables us to invest in the right things for our students.

Within the College Board, this year also marked a period of transition, with the farewell of three directors and the welcoming of four new directors. We express our sincere thanks and best wishes to Deborah Mullan, who has been a Board member since 2007; to Julianne Miller, who has served on the Board since 2014; and also to Greg McKillop, having served since 2015. They have made outstanding contributions to the life of St. Bede's through their ideas, innovations, dedication and hard work.

Joining the board as directors this year are Mr Geoff Worrell, Ms Carol Benton, Mr Sal Algeri and Mr Simon Libbis. Their expertise and enthusiasm will add much to our board as we oversee the continued development of the College. A great feature of our previous and current Board composition is that it includes representatives who are current parents of students, parents of past students, and old collegians, providing a really strong skills mix. Our continuing directors are Greg Adkins, Marg Burge, Br. Chris Gorringe, Stephen Gallagher, Andrew McLoughney and Russell Saunders. The Board is also supported by Board committees and I acknowledge the strong efforts of all current and new committee members in contributing to our school.

St Bede's ongoing success over many years has been a credit to the commitment of our Principal, the Brothers, teachers, staff, parents, friends and Old Collegians, working to deliver a quality Lasallian education to our young men. As we farewell 2018, the Board wishes to commend John and the entire school community for a most successful year.

As this is my first year at St Bede's College, I acknowledge the wonderful work of the Lasallian Principals who have preceded me. They, and many like-minded staff, dedicated their efforts to ensuring that the College was always reflective of the motto, Per Vias Rectas. This powerful image offers a sense of strength of character. Thus, our boys are encouraged to live the type of life that will model the tenets of a Lasallian education through Faith, Service and Community. We all have the great honour of being able to enrich our Catholic ethos through the Lasallian charism by using the story of St John Baptist de la Salle and the thousands of people from the past three centuries who have taken up the call.

I am aware of the responsibility that comes from being the first lay head of the College and will work fastidiously to ensure that the character of the school is never compromised. I experienced my commissioning as Principal early in the year. As a community we pledged to preserve the distinct heritage we have been entrusted with and to foster it for future generations, working in respectful partnership with the Order. My sincere hope is that our students are experiencing that sense of community through relationship and that they always feel happy to be themselves at school.

When I think of St John Baptist de la Salle I am reminded of a practical, intelligent man who served the needs of young people in their own context. We are called to do no less today. Whilst traditions should be preserved, we also keep a watchful eye on the future to prepare our young men for the world they are to enter.

The staff, students and Board of the College have taken a careful look at the many written statements around our Mission and Vision as a College. Our re-worded Mission and Vision Statements try to succinctly describe the reason for our being and acts as a moral compass in future decision making. These will be officially launched at the beginning of next year but are now, effectively, in place. I had the opportunity to meet with all of our Year 12 students at the 9 Retreats held throughout first term. The boys have a genuine affection for their school. They also have such wonderfully different aspirations for life beyond St Bede's. Importantly, they are a credit to their families. For many, the relationship they have with their friends is central to their own wellbeing and ensures a very important connection to the College. They have been young men of service. I have been grateful for the way in

which our senior boys have shown their support for me in my inaugural year; I have certainly appreciated their open dialogue, candour and good humour and wish them well in their future endeavours.

Our students and staff have been exposed to many meaningful and relevant liturgies and retreats across the year levels. We all know that spirituality is a personal experience and that young men need opportunity for reflection. Like many retreats you need to live the experience rather than try to describe it to others. These retreats have shown that there is a willingness for young men to share their personal journeys and to be willingly open to listening to the word of God in all its varied and wonderful forms. These students understand that relationships form the first pathway to God.

I have been pleased to meet a number of our parents throughout the year. Your support and encouragement of the works of the College are never taken for granted. The College is absolutely focused on the academic needs of our boys and places considerable time and resourcing into the development within and between year levels. We

want to foster a culture of study that leads to individual success for boys in the broadest sense. Success is in matching our talents against how we perform ourselves and knowing that we gave an honest effort. We are proud of the approach of the boys this year and hope that the end of year results and reports are reflective of such efforts.

Our boys have performed admirably in many areas this year. The play, Moonlight and Magnolias, and Grease, The Musical, were professionally produced and gave audiences both entertainment and insight. The Visual Arts and Technology Show was outstanding, showing that there are a multitude of ways that young men can display their talents across that wide field. On the sporting field we competed well across all year levels within the ACC competition. There were numerous successes (as listed later in this Yearbook).

St Bede's staff are to be commended on their collective endeavours over the year. So much of what happens pastorally often goes unseen by the many because the boys confide in, and rely on, their teachers in ways beyond the academic program. Our first priority is to teach well and in this process we realise that for a boy to learn he needs to be happy, feel appropriately challenged and be in a supportive environment. I thank the staff, both teaching and non-teaching, who work so diligently in that regard.

I would like to extend a sincere thank you to Br David Hawke and the Lasallian Mission Council and the Mentone Brothers Community for their generous welcome to me and for their wise counsel. Likewise my thanks are extended to the College Board for the confidence they have shown me (and in particular Board Chair, Mr Anthony Brinkley) and the Principal's Leadership Team for their counsel and willing spirit.

I wish to recognise the leadership shown by our College Captains, in James Hickey, Julian Taylor and Darcy Tilbrook as well as the student leadership team. They have epitomised the tenet of servant leadership in their dealings with our Community.

I look forward to the challenges that lie ahead in 2019 and beyond.

Will Hoey in 8.8 was selected to play in the U17 Australian Roller Hockey team at the upcoming trans-Tasman competition in Gympie.



Nate Dear will be representing Victoria & St Bede's College in the SSV15 National Championships held in Adelaide.




Callum Evans competed in the Gymnastic Championships in both individual and team

Following the Mass, supper was enjoyed by the several hundred who attended; among them were a great number of De La Salle Brothers, including former principals of St Bede's College, numerous Old Collegians, current students, families and staff. Many wise words, prayers, memories and updates were shared that evening but by far the most challenging words came to us from St Paul:

You are God's chosen race, his saints; he loves you, and you should be clothed in sincere compassion, in kindness and humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with one another; forgive each other as soon as a quarrel begins. The Lord has forgiven you; now you must do the same. Over all these clothes, to keep them together and complete them, put on love. And may the peace of Christ reign in your hearts, because it is for this that you were called together as parts of one body. Always be thankful. (Colossians 3:12-17)

From humble yet earnest beginnings, St Bede's College's rich history and tradition is still growing and thriving with over 1500 students and over 170 staff. In 2018, we aimed to be a centre of life, love and learning as we "Celebrated the Tradition and Lived the Gospel".

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION





From Year 7 to Year 12, students have engaged in numerous learning opportunities across the Religious Education Curriculum. New courses offered this year include VCAL Religious Education (RE) and Texts and Traditions (The Gospel of Luke) Units 3 and 4, now complementing the VCAA Religion and Society studies offered.

Whilst continuously striving for improvement in the area of RE, a significant development in the RE curriculum occurred for our students in Year 9.

During Semester 2, Year 9 students have been involved in a new RE elective program allowing students to exercise greater choice in their learning. The curriculum design was based on the Catholic

Education Melbourne's Religious Education Framework Pedagogy of Encounter, and shaped by student feedback. Students completed two of the following studies: RE and Sport, RE and Communications, RE and Art, RE and Food, RE and Business.

All students were encouraged to consider the overarching question "What brings fullness of life in the 21st Century?" to themselves, to other people they know, and to people they don't know. Initial student feedback and showcases of their learning have been very positive:







During the Term, House Debating was also held. We assembled a team of young emerging debaters to highlight our potential beyond







HASALIIAN SUTREACH























St Bede's College proudly organises three annual international outreach volunteer programmes where students and staff give their time to support the works conducted by the De La Salle Brothers in India and Thailand. The building projects undertaken by these groups are made possible by the funds raised by our Mission Action Day campaign.

Thailand

In 2018, two groups of Year 11 students and staff travelled to Sangkhlaburi, Thailand (located 350km NW of Bangkok) to provide outreach to two Lasallian schools – the Bamboo School and the La Salle Sangklaburi School. At these schools, the De La Salle Brothers help displaced and impoverished children complete their primary education.

Since 2013, St Bede's College volunteers have worked tirelessly

during their time at these schools building two hostels, a dormitory, study hall and a combined kitchen and dining hall to care for over thirty orphaned, refugee or neglected children; a new canteen; a multipurpose recreation building; and a toilet block to provide much needed sanitation infrastructure. This year's Thailand volunteers continued such work by building a new volunteer's house to cater for the growing number

of volunteers that visit and help the Brothers with their work, as well as completing some landscaping and planting works in the area surrounding the volunteer's house.

When the volunteers were not involved in building works, they involved themselves in recreating and organising games for the school children, supporting teachers in the classroom, and participating in school activities and ceremonies.





HASALLIAN OUTREACH









India

In December 2017, a group of staff and Year 12 students travelled to a small village near Batlagundu in Tamil Nadu, Southern India. There the volunteers worked with Reaching the Unreached (RTU), an organisation founded by the late De La Salle Brother James Kimpton FSC.

Primarily, the volunteers worked with the housing division of RTU to build five houses for extremely poor villagers whose income is not more than \$3 per day. The living conditions of these villagers and their families usually consists of thatched huts that not only need replacing every year or two depending on the severity of the monsoons, but also have no basic amenities such as sanitation, plumbing and electricity. The houses that the volunteers built were permanent structures made of bricks and mortar with all essential amenities. Away from this building work, the volunteer's also spent plenty of time recreating with and living among orphaned, neglected and HIV positive children that RTU care for at their hostels and orphanages.



Without the help Coordinators, vigilant teachers, parents and peers, many concerns would not be addressed. Our connections Headspace, **General Practitioners** and other external agencies ensure that the wellbeing of our young men is key to their development. As well as meeting with students individually, the Counsellors were invited to present to various Year Levels and classes on topics of anxiety, identity and exam preparation.

This year, we welcomed Sophie Gonzales to the Counselling Team. Sophie has become a valuable addition to our team and is building a solid client base and knowledge of the St Bede's Community through her contact with staff and students.

As Chairperson of the Child Safe School Committee and subcommittee for students, Scott Cadby assisted Enzo di Toro in preparing St Bede's for the Child Safety Audit. The Staff and Student Committees meet each term to ensure that each student attending St Bede's is safe in all dimensions of their schooling, home life and personal development. Staff receive ongoing Professional Development in Child Safety Documents related to Child Safety are located on the St Bede's College website.

Our Games Cove continued with a healthy representation from Year 7 and 8 students supported by Year 12 Leaders. St Bedes Debating Squad

Problem-solving, analytical thinking, creativity and collaboration – whilst these are all desired traits in the modern workplace, they are also the foundation on which St Bede's has built a successful year of debating competitions and privileged immersion experiences.

With a squad of 40 boys, teams were fielded in both Debaters Association of Victoria (DAV) and Associated Catholic Colleges (ACC) competitions. There were also new initiatives for Senior students - including Model United Nations Association and Youth Parliament. St Bede's College 1, D Grade were crowned as Champions of the statewide DAV competition. A great achievement considering the starting field was 800 teams. Congratulations to Elijah McEvoy, Lyndon Bulman, Lachlan Doyle, Tomas Cooling, Ben Martinelli and their mentor Mr Carl DeSouza. The DAV Swannie Award being won by Year 10 student Sam Murray. He achieved the highest average C Grade speaker score across Bayside region.

In the July term break, the annual Youth Parliament Event sat at Victorian Parliament House, and was entered by six Senior students generously sponsored by Mr Peter Walsh. This group collaborated over a sevenmonth period to identify possible subjects for draft legislation to be researched, politically framed and submitted for initial consideration by the YMCA. Upon receipt of one of the 20 places in the program, the real work began: to scrutinise, refine, test and perfect the legislation for its presentation in the Legislative Assembly. The group was privileged throughout the process to have the audience of some prominent political figures, including Shadow Minister for Education Tim Smith MP; Murray Thompson MP; Liberal Party member for Sandringham Murray Thompson MLA; and St Bede's Old Collegian and local Liberal Party Candidate Brad Roswell. Their Life Skills Education Development Bill was presented in a mock Parliament Assembly on July 5 and passed. Rami Saab was awarded the Dave Davis Award for upholding values of the YMCA throughout the program.

The annual Junior School Challenge helped new debaters get involved and established debaters learn to adjudicate and broaden their skill bases further. Our busy schedule continues to show that there is much activity and many initiatives in debating. All designed to immerse students in contemporary social contexts and develop their soft skills in readiness for life beyond school gates.

Thank you to staff mentors Carl DeSouza, Viv Ditcham and Sally Spencer for their assistance and guidance of students throughout the year. It would have been impossible to have run so many teams and events without your valued support. 

CAREERS

Careers

The Careers and Pathways Centre continues to provide a central place for students seeking information about courses and careers. The Centre is continually updating its many resources, and is open to students every recess and lunchtime. Throughout the year, individual careers counselling was provided to a very large number of students, along with more general careers advice including VTAC course selections, SEAS and Scholarships, subject selection planning, vocational testing, post-compulsory transition planning, apprenticeship information and job applications.

Careers Insight Evening

The Careers Insight Evening on 27 February gave our students in Years 9 to 12, along with their parents, a real insight into over 60 different careers. The students and their parents had the opportunity to hear about the industry the speakers were currently working in, the different jobs they have held, the courses they completed and any advice they could offer to our students. There was also an opportunity for questions and answers at the end of





each session. Networking was alive and well on the night. Many students in Year 10 secured work experience. Each year, we have a mix of young and older speakers offering both depth and relevance to our students. We sincerely thank our 60+ Old

VTAC Information Seminar

This year the annual VTAC Information Session, held in our College Hall, was exceptionally well attended with over 85% of all Year 12 students and their parents attending. Suzanne Connelly, the Director of Publications and Information Services for VTAC (Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre), presented a very practical and informative session focusing on how best to apply for tertiary courses, special consideration applications,



costs, etc. Parents were very grateful to receive such down to earth advice on how to assist their sons during this busy time of their year 12.

College Careers Website

The College Careers Website had a makeover with many new, innovative and useful links provided to our students and wider community. For example, it now has a calendar linked to every careers event in Victoria allowing students to plan their activities in advance. In the secure 'For Students' portal, they can



reflect on their interests, skills and work values and see how these relate to careers. Students can create and edit a resume, write job cover letters and complete a mock job application. They can also do some different career plans and even develop an online digital portfolio.

In Term 2, all Year 10 students used this site to investigate a job and followed up by researching any prerequisites that may be required for a course leading to this type of work.

PACTS (Parents As Career Transition Support)

The PACTS program is a series of workshops developed to provide parents with timely information about educational pathways and offers ideas to support their sons in making career transition decisions. PACTS programs are run for parents during Term 1 and 2. This year, over 80 parents attended these sessions.

As recently appointed Resource Centre Leader, it has become apparent to me that we are a very busy place. Our records indicate that in Term 2 our average daily usage was 594 students during school periods including before school, recess, lunch, and after school. This is wonderful to see and I look forward to working closely with my team in addressing the challenges of running a busy library while supporting the school's pastoral objectives.

We also look forward to developing our students' reading capabilities and research skills in a world of online convenience. Our students live in a world where temptations to cut and paste information are prevalent at the expense of deep and meaningful learning.

We welcome Riny Davis, our Digital Services Librarian. Riny has been developing our databases and working on our new 'Libguides' online curation

project. This initiative involves the services of Sue Ward, our Curriculum Resources Teacher Librarian who has been sourcing authoritative online content to be included on our Libguides page in support of the curriculum. Teachers and students can use these Libquides knowing the online content is authoritative and appropriate to various reading levels. Sue has continued to run our successful bookclub, Boyzread, which holds a variety of activities to excite boys about reading and encourages student leadership. 



Beacon supports the learning needs of students at the College who, for any number of reasons, may experiencing learning difficulties. Our vision is to enable all students to be able to access the curriculum to the very best of their ability, achieve individual success and develop their literacy skills.

Our Language Workshops support classes from Year 7 to 9, and aim to engage students in literacy by focusing on high interest topics that appeal specifically to boys. We use a range of resources to target the basic skills required in reading, comprehension tasks, spelling and written language. We involve the small group classes in plenty of lively discussion in the process.

This year, we have been very lucky to have Lisa Leeds, Lisa Coate and Barry McLaren as our Learning Support Assistants, all of whom have worked very hard in the classrooms helping both teachers and students. Their supportive work assisting the boys to develop their organisational, planning and prioritising skills, has been invaluable.

Our Homework Help Program has continued to operate every Wednesday afternoon from 3.30pm – 4.15pm in S31. However, it would be great to see more boys, particularly those in Years 7 and 8, coming along to Homework Help and reap the benefits of specialised homework support each week.

2018 has been another busy and productive year in the Learning Support Department. Beacon staff have worked collaboratively with students, parents, St Bede's College staff and visiting teachers, utilising best practice to meet the learning needs of all boys involved with the Beacon program. Intensive support for our students continues to be implemented through the following programs and activities:

- Small group Language Workshop classes for Years 7 to 9
- Homework Help (Wednesdays 3.30pm-4.15pm)
- Program Support Group meetings with parents and referrals to external agencies
- Additional school visits to assist orientation for incoming Year 7 students

- Special Provisions for students during exams
- Provision of individualised classroom accommodations, adjustments and development of Personal Learning Plans
- Tailored Pathways Program in the city for a select group of Year 10 boys
- Games Cove lunchtime social skills and friendship building program

Victorian Curriculum of **Applied** Learning (VCAL) program designed to is provide with students an alternative 'hands on' option their senior studies. for providing We focus on students with practical work related experiences alongside numeracy, literacy, personal skills, development work related skills and religious education.

All students must attend school for three days a week, while attending a VET Course on one day and undertaking a structured work placement related to their chosen industry on the other day.

A large variety of VET courses have been well supported by our students in 2018. Students have had the opportunity to successfully complete a Certificate II in Business (Applied Learning) as part of their VCAL studies internally within St Bede's in addition to external VET Certificates run at TAFE colleges. Industries in which students have undertaken a VET certificate are Building & Construction, Automotive, Electrotechnology, Plumbing, Aviation, Hospitality and Music Industry.

At St Bede's College, our students are encouraged to develop a wide range of skills with specific links back to their family, school and community. Several activities which the students have undertaken throughout 2018, give our students the ability to be leaders while contributing to the greater community. Students who are undertaking their VCAL certificates have been involved with a program facilitated by the

education organisation Food Security Network. This program introduces students to the growing problems of food insecurity and homelessness in Melbourne. While learning about these big issues students grow an edible harvest of vegetables for donation to welfare agencies. The students learn a range of skills from the practical, like costing of the project, building planter boxes, creating and maintaining the vegetable crops to the science of growing vegetables.

At the end of the growing season, the crops will be harvested and offered

to organisations such as the Fair Share Kitchen or the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre. We encourage all students to enhance their skill level and involve themselves in teamwork and community spirit.





















Our students have also been on some very interesting excursions, which have a very strong link to the curriculum. Students had the opportunity to visit Marngoneet Correctional Facility, where they were confronted and challenged by prisoners' real life experiences about what led them to be there. Students also met with Teenage Road Accident Group (TRAG), which highlighted the importance of making good choices.

Personal development activities have engaged students in rock climbing, self-defence, paddle boarding and lawn bowls. Students have also worked alongside Parkdale Beach Patrol where they volunteered to collect rubbish from the beach spanning Mentone to Parkdale. This



highlights the community emphasis and importance in skill development that our young men have obtained through our VCAL program.



Such skills have also been used in the students structured work placement. Students have worked in a large variety of industry-specific work places, which has encapsulated and honed in on the importance of applying such skills to a real work life situation. Work Placement has been exceptionally successful this year and has helped lead many of our students into apprenticeships and future careers.

Overall, this year has been exceptionally rewarding and has challenged students while engaging them to further grow confidence, knowledge and skills of real life work and community situations.

The study of a language other than English contributes to the overall education of students, most particularly in the area of communication, but also in the areas of cross-cultural understanding, cognitive development, literacy and general knowledge. It provides access to the culture of communities which use the language, and promotes understanding of different attitudes and values within the wider Australian community and beyond.

The Department of Education believes that learning languages broadens students' horizons about the personal, social, cultural and employment opportunities that are available in an increasingly interconnected and interdependent world. Learning languages also extends literacy repertoires; contributing to the strengthening of the community's social, economic and international

development. Learning languages also develops intercultural capability and understanding of how culture shapes and strengthens intellectual, analytical, and reflective thinking.

The Years 7 to 10 language students at St Bede's college acquire communication skills in Italian, French and Indonesian. Students develop understanding of the role language and culture plays in communication,

including the relationship between language, culture and learning, and develop intercultural capabilities.

This year, all our language students been learning different topics and participated in different activities during International Study Tour, excursions and incursions, and students have developed their communication skills.

Almost all language students have participated in the World and Victorian Language Perfect Competitions. History and Geography students of all year levels have had a very engaging year, attending a number of excursions and fieldwork activities throughout 2018.

During Term 3, Year 8 students visited the Vikings: Beyond the Legend exhibition at the Melbourne Museum. Students had the rare privilege of viewing genuine Viking artefacts that have been on loan to Victoria from the Swedish History Museum in Stockholm. Some of the relics included swords dating from 700-1100CE, jewellery, clothing, household tools, ceramics, game pieces, bones and musical instruments. The definite highlight for the students was viewing the Krampmacken, a replica of a ninemetre Viking merchant boat found in Gotland Island in Sweden in the 1920's.

Year 10 History students also visited the Melbourne Immigration Museum and the Jewish Holocaust Centre. At the Holocaust Centre, students had

YR 10 History - Flynn Morley

Midway through term 3, year 10 history students were fortunate enough to travel to the city on an excursion to both the Immigration and Holocaust museums. Each institution greatly complimented our learning in class and offered us an invaluable insight into different periods of history. Our experience at the Holocaust museum was particularly meaningful; when we were given the privilege of listening to a Holocaust survivor describe her life during World War 2. The experience made all present even more aware of the horrifying events of the period and its lingering impact in the lives of many.

This year, Year 10's had the privilege of attending both the Immigration museum and Holocaust museum.

Our first stop was the Immigration museum, where we discussed the different waves of immigration to Australia throughout our history. We were then allocated time to browse the museum, with many different cultures from different time periods on display. Later, we travelled to the Holocaust Museum, in Elsternwick, where we met with Holocaust survivors. We were provided a tour of the museum, demonstrating the history and struggles many individuals faced within Europe from 1933-1945, as well as the following years after the conclusion of the Second World War, as their homes and livelihood had been tragically destroyed. Afterwards, we met with Holocaust survivors, who shared their stories from one of the darkest and most oppressive eras in history. It was an honour to listen to and meet with such people, as young people today will be the last generation to meet with Holocaust survivors.

It was a successful year for the Science Department at St. Bede's College. We are always looking to celebrate achievement and interest in science and this year was no different as we had a number of wonderful events going on. It was great to see many fantastic results from our 2017 **VCE Science subjects. Excellent** study scores were achieved by many students who completed one or more of Biology, **Environmental** Chemistry, Science, Physics, or Psychology.

In May, over 100 keen science students from Years 7 to 10 competed in the Big Science Competition, designed to test their science skills and understanding. Whilst every one of those students did an amazing job there were three results that really stood out – Sam Anthonisz (7.4), Ben Uehara (9.4) and Flynn Morley (10.35). All achieved the result of High

Distinction, which put their score in the top 5% of all students competing. Well done to those three students, as well as all of the other students who competed.

The Science Department also celebrated National Science Week in mid-August. The theme was 'Game Changers and Change Makers'. It celebrated innovators throughout our scientific history. There were a number of different activities where students could get involved and share their interest in science including:





F1™ in Schools

The pace and success of the in Schools program continued at St Bede's College in 2018. The focus for this year was Team Propulsion's pursuit to make the World Finals in Singapore by competing at the Australian National Finals of the Formula 1™ STEM Challenge. This was held in Launceston, Tasmania, from 4th March to 9th March 2018.

Rhys Bennett, Harry Jeffs, Gus O'Toole and Tom Skehan are the members of Team Propulsion. They were crowned Victorian State Champions in 2017 which provided the platform to compete at the Australian National Finals in the Senior Professional Class of the challenge.

In the months leading up to the event, the team worked tirelessly and professionally to ensure all competition elements, which included designing, testing and manufacturing a miniature Formula 1™ car capable of speeds of up to 80km/h, were completed to the highest standard. Along the way, they also collaborated with many organisations, industry and higher education facilities to source knowledge, funding and various resources. So many skills were developed by the competing students as they problem solved and overcame many challenges.

The level of competition amongst the 33 teams competing at the Australian National Finals was extremely high. Given the demanding nature of the Formula 1TM STEM Challenge which involves more than 10 million school students from 17,000 schools across 44 nations each year, including around 40,000 in Australia, making it to the Australian National Finals was

in itself an extraordinary achievement. Nonetheless, Team Propulsion competed very strongly, enjoying some significant successes along the way including not breaching any critical regulations (one of only 7 teams), being in the lead group of having the fastest car, and narrowly missing out (by half a point) on best verbal presentation. In the end, Team Propulsion finished 7th, narrowly missing a finish in the top 5.

Congratulations to all St Bede's students involved or showed interest in the F1TM in Schools program for 2018! It is always great to see students passionate about the work they undertake and producing results across the fields of engineering, science, finance, marketing and public relations.












COMMERCE

In the last game of the season, St Bede's travelled to Whitefriars







St Bede's is a great place to be if you are a young man who enjoys participating in sport. Apart from a fantastic Physical Education curriculum, the students have the opportunity to participate in Athletics, Swimming and Cross Country House Carnivals as well as interschool sport as part of the Associated Catholic Colleges (ACC) Competition.

The ACC is the largest association of Catholic boys' schools in Victoria comprising almost 14,000 boys from twelve schools spread throughout Melbourne – CBC St Kilda, De La Salle College Malvern, Emmanuel College Altona North, Mazenod College Mulgrave, Parade College Bundoora, Salesian College Chadstone, Simonds College West Melbourne, St Bede's, St Bernard's Essendon, St Joseph's Ferntree Gully, St Joseph's Geelong and Whitefriars College in Donvale. Our Year 9 and 10 students compete in a weekly Tuesday afternoon competition, our Senior boys on a Wednesday and our Year 7 and 8 students play each Thursday.

The ACC offers a wide range of sports such as Australian Rules Football, Basketball, Cricket, Hockey, Soccer, Table Tennis, Tennis, Volleyball, Athletics, Cross Country, Swimming, Chess, Golf, Badminton, Lawn Bowls and Triathlon. Over the course of the

year St Bede's enters over 60 teams in the ACC competition. To be able to do that, we need teachers to coach each of these teams. We are extremely lucky here at St Bede's that we have staff who are willing to give up their time each term to coach our teams. They take training sessions, selection trials, team meetings and of course they coach each match day – often not getting back to school until after 6pm. The Role of Honour induction was the highlight of the evening during which the work and efforts of the inductees, namely Br Josephus Garrity, Paul Diggerson, Tricia McCormack, Chris Comas, Paul Swannie and Br Michael McCabe were recognised and celebrated in a moving series of tributes. I know from personal discussions that the evening was thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended, and all proceeds from the event were channelled to the Finnian Foundation.

In addition to the six Anniversary Reunions, we have also continued the Young Collegians University Coffee Catch Up events at Deakin University, Monash University and RMIT City Campus. Feedback confirms these gatherings allowed newer graduates to maintain contact with past students and the Association as they progress their education and prepare for their careers, and the events continue to gain momentum each year.

Briefly, other initiatives include -

- (i) Delivery of the popular Careers Night presentations to latter year St Bede's students in March at which 65 Old Collegians present to over 620 St Bede's students and families, an event that was rated as a terrific success by the students and affords a unique opportunity for Old Collegians to contribute to the life of St Bede's;
- (ii) Focused development of the Beda Boy Graduate Database, including launching the Old Collegians App and updating the Old Collegians website to facilitate and enhance regular contact with as many Old Collegians as possible;
- (iii) A renewed focus on developing alternative fundraising opportunities, including launching The St Bede's Community Online Business Directory

facilitate connections between families of current and past students and members of the local community;

- (iv) Initiatives under development to engage younger graduates with the Old Collegians events to strengthen Association. These include planning an International Outreach Program for graduates modelled on the successful two-week Thailand Mission Outreach Program offered by St Bede's to senior students:
- (v) A relaunch of the McCristal Club as the Beda Boys Brotherhood. This initiative was driven by former President Steve Ager with the objective of providing non-monetary support to Old Collegians who require some form of assistance to cope with their current situation.

Finally, the Annual Finian Foundation Fundraising Breakfast and Golf Day were held at Woodlands Golf Club in October. These popular and important community events raise funds for the Finian Foundation, that can be then used to provide financial support to families of students in their final years at St Bede's who have encountered unforeseen hardship.

These activities represent only a snapshot of the overall work and efforts of all the volunteers who tirelessly 'give-back' to the College and its community through Old Collegians. I am very proud to be in a position to report the Association's achievements and successes.

Thank you to the Principal, Mr John Finn, College Board, College Leadership Team and the staff for all their ongoing support, and our Executive Officer Jo Hynes for her boundless energy, enthusiasm, and organisational skills. I look forward to working with many of you as we continue to build the Old Collegians network in service of the St Bede's community in the Lasallian tradition."
